TNB RESKILLING MALAYSIA: SUPPORTING BUSINESSES

TENAGA Nasional Berhad (TNB) has introduced the TNB Reskilling Malaysia initiative as part of its strategy to support the country's economic recovery from the widespread socio-economic impact of the Covid-19 pandemic.

TNB Reskilling Malaysia is being implemented to benefit both businesses and the rakyat alike.

TNB seeks to support businesses located in Malaysia by providing recruitment services and candidate sourcing to fill their vacant positions.

The reskilling training programme for successful candidates will then be conducted by TNB Integrated Learning Solution Sdn Bhd (TNB ILSAS) – a subsidiary of TNB.

TNB ILSAS plays a major role in conducting human capability development programmes for the nation through various plans for TNB, industries, utilities and universities.

This initiative will help businesses save costs and resources, improve the quality of hired personnel, and reduce employee turnover.

The national utility company will commit up to RM43m to partially fund this key initiative. This includes training costs and retrofitting part of TNB's Universiti Tenaga Nasional's (UNITEN) Muadzam Shah campus into an open access reskilling centre.

This programme is expected to benefit companies in Malaysia, filling up to 17,500 vacancies – approximately 5,000 per year over a span of three and a half years.

Since its inception in October 2020, more than 1,700 job vacancies have been successfully filled in more than 160 participating companies.

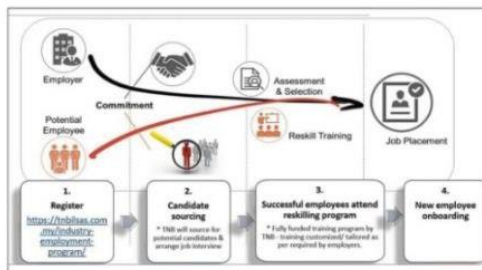
The Covid-19 pandemic has certainly taken its toll on the global and local economy in addition to the health and wellbeing of billions around the world.

In Malaysia, the effects of the pandemic are equally extensive, affecting the livelihood of business owners, the unemployed and those recently retrenched during the peak of the global health crisis.

The Department of Statistics Malaysia reported that as at April 2021, the unemployment rate in Malaysia is at 4.6% – equivalent to 742,700 jobless Malaysians.

implemented to support Malaysians – particularly fresh graduates, school leavers or retrenched workers – who will benefit from being matched with suitable and available job vacancies, and then reskilled through relevant training programmes based on the employers' requirements.

For participating employers, TNB provides an employment recruitment service to source potential candidates and reskill them. This programme is available at no cost to companies, manufacturers and micro, small and medium enterprises (SMEs) located in Malaysia.

TNB is committed to support companies in hiring reskilled workers. The training programmes available under the TNB Reskilling Malaysia initiative are catered for companies in the energy industry and beyond.

The reskilling training programmes kicked off with five flagship programmes – Solar Panel Installer Programme, Smart Meter Installer Programme, Power System Operation and Maintenance, Medium Voltage Electrical Facilities and Low Voltage Electrical Facilities – designed for selected industries.

More reskilling training programmes have been developed to better meet the needs of

companies in Malaysia.

The courses are not limited by the roles above as TNB ILSAS also offers the option of tailoring reskilling training courses according to the needs of potential employers. TNB ILSAS will also be extending its list of programmes.

Naluri Rasa Sdn Bhd joined TNB Reskilling Malaysia seeking smart meter installation services.

To date, the company has successfully selected 66 candidates from the programme, who were sought out, matched and reskilled. "We have been on the lookout for more talent to implement our smart meter installations," said Naluri Rasa director Mohd Khairul Idlan Mohd Nor.
